# EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

# 1. Executive Summary

This Outdoor Facilities Master Plan (OFMP) presents a valuable opportunity for the Town of Burlington to develop a realistic, actionable strategy that outlines improvements to and expansion of its outdoor recreational resources. It offers guidance in directing Burlington's future investments in a way that benefits the diverse needs of the community. The overall goals of this plan are to:

- Inventory and assess existing active and passive Parks & Recreation outdoor recreational facilities. Active recreation refers to a structured individual or team activity that requires the use of special facilities, courts, fields, or equipment. Examples include organized sports such as baseball, soccer, and tennis or planned activity sites such as playgrounds. Passive recreation refers to recreational activities that do not require prepared facilities like walking, picnicking, and wildlife viewing. Burlington boasts an array of existing active and passive outdoor recreational assets, including (14) park and (6) school properties with amenities including courts, fields, playgrounds, walking trails, dog parks, a skate park, a disc golf course, and others.
- Provide opportunities for the community to offer input on outdoor recreational needs and recommendations.
- Identify key community needs and propose a plan for improving facilities and / or constructing new facilities to meet them.
- Create a strategic roadmap for future investment and implementation that includes capital and maintenance projects, prioritization, design considerations and resources, and potential funding sources.

This plan is comprised of three main sections: *Existing Conditions*, *What We Heard*, and *Strategic Recommendations*.

The *Existing Conditions* section situates where Burlington's outdoor recreational facilities are today through the completion of (17) comprehensive on-site evaluations of Burlington's parks and school properties, comparison with national recreation trends, analysis of historical permitting data, and analysis of demographic trends. The remaining 3 recreational assets are all school properties. Marshall Simonds Middle School and Burlington High School recently received separate analysis from the town and were not reevaluated as part of this report. Fox Hill Elementary School is in the process of a complete redesign with the goal of construction being completed in 2028. The findings from the existing conditions assessment and analysis were used to establish a preliminary framework of community needs.

The *What We Heard* section summarizes the comprehensive public engagement effort. As part of this effort, Parks & Recreation and Weston & Sampson organized and collected input through several in-person events and online surveys. In-person input from the community regarding (2) proposed park master plans was gathered at Burlington's annual Community Tree Lighting Event, as well as a Stakeholder Event that collected input on draft strategic recommendations. In addition, two online public surveys additionally collected feedback on the proposed master plans and Burlington's town-wide recreational outdoor facilities. The valuable feedback collected from this effort confirmed observations from the *Existing Conditions* section, informed additional critical community needs, and served as a driver of the strategic recommendations.

The *Strategic Recommendations* section forms the actionable takeaways of this plan. Framing this section are overarching goals identified in the previous sections. These goals guide the proposed improvement projects, ensuring that they are aligned with the community's values established through two community engagement events. The three overarching goals are as follows: Improve Existing Outdoor Recreational Facilities, Expand Outdoor Recreational Facilities, and Provide Equitable Access to Outdoor Recreational Facilities.

# EXISTING CONDITIONS

## 2. Existing Conditions

The *Existing Conditions* section is an inventory and analysis of Burlington's current outdoor recreational offerings, comprised of the following pieces: Demographic Trends, Site Evaluations, Benchmarking against NRPA Agency Performance Reviews and Permitting Data. The inventory and analysis provided here serves as a critical first step in identifying gaps and opportunities in the Town's outdoor recreational system.

### 2.1. Demographic Trends

Committed to health and well-being, the Town of Burlington boasts a thriving community with ample recreation resources for its residential population. Burlington's population has continued to grow since the former farming village quadrupled in size during the 1950s and 1960s when Route 128 was built through the town, causing industrial expansion and commercialization. Employment and the highly regarded education system continue to attract young families with school-aged children. In fact, Burlington saw a growth rate of 6.9% over the course of the last decade; the population increased to 26,377 according to the 2020 U.S. Census Bureau, up from 24,498 in 2010. Only in the last two years has Burlington's population dipped. The U.S. Census Bureau's 2022 American Community Survey 5-Year Estimates counted a population of 26,169 just two years ago. There are likely to be many reasons why the Town's population has changed after decades of such rapid growth. Throughout the United States, the 2020 COVID-19 pandemic crisis impacted community population sizes as people fled urban areas for the space and access to nature offered by the suburbs and countryside; many of the pandemic's long-term effects are just being realized and understood and could be the cause for the sudden population change here. The Burlington Comprehensive Master Plan Summary suggests an increase in housing prices may be having an impact on resident numbers. Still, other powers are at work that influence a community's population size over time. Careful monitoring of the Town's population size should inform growing or shrinking demands for sports and fitness activities. The COVID-19 health crisis caused unparalleled changes to the way people work and socialize and undoubtedly to the way people use recreational resources now and how they will use them in the future.

Most Burlington residents are highly educated and enjoy greater wealth than the averages for Massachusetts, according to the U.S. Census and demographic information in the Town of Burlington Athletic Field Assessment & Master Plan. In 2020, 58.2% of residents had earned a bachelor's degree or higher, which is about 1.3 times the state rate (45.2%). The median household income was \$124,755, about 1.4 times higher than the statewide median income of \$89,026. However, 5% of residents in Burlington live below the poverty line. Most residents are classified as Married Couples (75%) according to the last census (2020) and the average household size was 2.6 persons per household, indicating families with children. Such demographic data suggests that residents with greater wealth may have more opportunities to enjoy leisure pursuits including recreation. Household units comprised of families with children may have recreation needs that are different from an aging population. Needs identified through demographic trends can start to inform how the Town plans and prioritizes recreational resources.

An ethnically and racially diverse community, one third of Burlington residents identify as non-white, according to the 2020 U.S. Census; this number is in keeping with the changing demographics of the region (Greater Boston Area). The Burlington Comprehensive Master Plan Summary's vision statement calls for finding 'common ground' by addressing this diverse community's varied interests and activities. A broad range of recreational resources must satisfy the personal fitness goals of so many different residents. As suggested in the 2023 Athletic Fields Assessment & Master Plan, ongoing investment in existing infrastructure must continue so recreation resources remain a source of community pride, providing a place for residents to meet and socialize. Also critical is prioritizing new sport trends desired by diverse populations to increase inclusive access and promote healthy lifestyles for residents of all backgrounds and ages.

The Town of Burlington differs from other area towns in that its daytime worker population is drastically different than its nighttime resident population. This dramatic daytime influx has an impact on open space and recreation needs within the Town. While most Town recreation resources are geared toward nighttime residents, some consideration should be given to providing open space and recreational resources for daytime workers particularly if there are underutilized open spaces along heavily trafficked roads near commercial offices that could be reprogramed to cater to daytime workers.

Understanding and evaluating demographic trends in Burlington is critical to ensuring that the Town's residents have access to inclusive, "safe, well-maintained, and functional recreational spaces," as identified in the 2023 Athletic Fields Assessment & Master Plan. Knowing information about who resides in Burlington and how they might like to recreate can contribute to the Town's effort to improve and expand its recreational resources for all to enjoy for generations to come.

Sources for the data and analysis above include the United States Census Bureau 2020 Decennial Census, the United States Census Bureau 2022 American Community Survey 5-Year Estimates, the Burlington Comprehensive Master Plan Summary, and the 2023 Town of Burlington Athletic Field Assessment & Master Plan. These sources are listed in the *References* section of this plan.

## **2.2. Site Evaluations**

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### **2.2.1. | Summary of Findings**

Comprehensive site assessments were undertaken for seventeen (17) open space properties, including fourteen (14) parks and three (3) school facilities. These site assessments evaluated existing conditions critically and identified opportunities pertaining to ADA accessibility, courts and fields, playground surfacing and equipment, vehicular and pedestrian circulation, plant material, environmental resources, site amenities, and infrastructure. Detailed worksheets for each site are included in Appendix D: Site Evaluations. Broadly, the following themes or opportunities were identified:

- **Upgrade field conditions (11 properties).** This includes regrading and stormwater management, reorienting fields for optimal solar conditions wherever possible, reskinning infields, and evaluating the potential for synthetic turf rectangular fields and ballfields.
- **Add or upgrade field amenities (13 properties).** Additional or upgraded field amenities include new spectator seating, team benches, covered dugouts, fencing, sports lighting, and scoreboards.
- **Upgrade court conditions (7 properties).** Upgrades include court surfacing, equipment, size/runoff zone, and striping for basketball, pickleball, tennis, street hockey, and volleyball courts.
- **Add accessible parking (6 properties).** Accessible parking upgrades include ensuring ADA-compliant surfacing, striping, and signage at ADA spaces and that accessible parking spaces are located near the primary site entrance and major amenities.
- **Provide or upgrade accessible pathways (15 properties).** Accessible routes should either be established or upgraded that connect site amenities and connect parking to site amenities.
- **Add or upgrade site amenities (16 properties).** Additional or upgraded site amenities include picnic tables, shade pavilions, drinking fountains, and benches along accessible routes. There is an additional opportunity to include ADA-compliant picnic tables and benches with companion seating.
- **Upgrade playgrounds (9 properties).** There are opportunities across multiple sites to expand and upgrade playground equipment to provide a diversity of inclusive play opportunities and replace existing surfacing with ADA-compliant surfacing.
- **Incorporate signage (4 properties).** Trail, site wayfinding, and interpretive signage could be incorporated.
- **Explore noise mitigation strategies (1 property).** For properties adjacent to heavily trafficked roads, landscape-oriented noise mitigation strategies such as berthing the land and buffer plantings could be explored.
- **Manage vegetation (4 properties).** This includes managing invasive species, pruning trees, and clearing overgrown vegetated areas from pathways and recreational amenities.
- **Remove old infrastructure and/or explore new programming (5 properties).** There is an opportunity to remove infrastructure that is not currently used. With the space that results, new programming could be incorporated. Additionally, sites with underutilized space could offer opportunities to incorporate additional recreational programs desired by the community.

## 2.3. Benchmarking Against NRPA Agency Performance Review

The National Park and Recreation Association (NRPA) is a not-for-profit agency dedicated to fostering excellence in parks, recreation, and community engagement since its founding in 1965. The NRPA collects data and works with local parks and recreation departments to evaluate current park facilities, programming, local parks and recreation responsibilities, staffing, parks/recreation budgets and funding, and policies for communities across the country. The data collected by NRPA is a valuable tool for communities like Burlington to use to compare their current public space and recreational amenities to other communities of comparable size. Local governments can use this information to determine where they currently excel and where improvements can be made to their recreational offerings and services to ensure and maintain continued access to and use of their recreational facilities. The 2023 NRPA Agency Performance Review was used to understand where the Town's current recreational offerings stand compared to municipalities with similar populations. The findings shown in Table 2-2: Comparison with National Parks and Recreation Association Data reveal that Burlington is on par or exceeds the recommended quantity for all recreational facilities evaluated except for the swimming pool. From this comparison, the Town could consider adding an outdoor swimming pool to its recreational amenities to align with resources provided by other similar communities. Otherwise, the comparison suggests that the number of recreational facilities offered is suitable for the size of the town.

While the NRPA offers a valuable tool for comparing a community's resources against others, it is worth noting that the results from this comparison must next be considered within the unique context of the community to develop a full picture and provide recommendations. For example, although Burlington's cricket field quantity matches that recommended by the NRPA, public input and an investigation of permitting data revealed a need for additional cricket field space due to the growing popularity of the sport. Contextualizing the multipurpose fields quantity is also valuable in drawing conclusions and recommendations. While the number of multipurpose fields appears suitable given the size of the community, as it exceeds the recommended NRPA quantity, a strong desire for maximizing field space resulting from the public input program suggested a need to extend the use hours for the existing fields.

Another consideration to be made is the distribution of recreational amenities throughout the town. It is recommended that a walkshed analysis be performed through ArcGIS mapping to determine the number of residences in Burlington within a set walkable distance of a recreational amenity. Community engagement revealed residents' interest in equitable access to parks and a walkshed analysis can help to identify areas in need of better access to recreation amenities.

## 2.4. Permitting & Registration Data

Examining past permitting uses for Burlington's facilities as well as registration data for leagues using the facilities provided important context for this plan. Observing trends in facility usage over time can uncover reasons behind the uptick in wear and tear, as well as help inform investment decisions for future projects. When combined with site assessments, examining the usage hours for various facilities can help determine which facilities are more popular than others, what sports

are growing/lessening in popularity, what facilities may need renovating, and what additional facilities may be worth building in the future.

A few notes on the data:

1. This permitting data was gathered over a six-year period from April 2018 to March 2024.
2. The available permitting data occurred during a global pandemic when typical programming, sports, and indoor activities were largely scaled back or cancelled.
3. It should be acknowledged that not all facility use is coordinated through the permitting process (i.e., pick-up games, informal team play and scrimmages, and activities/games with family and friends are typically not tied to a permit and cannot be tracked).
4. It should also be acknowledged that permitting varies by recreation type. For example, tennis and pickleball courts are not permitted except for set scheduled use by the Burlington High School tennis team in spring and for the Burlington Parks & Recreation-sponsored youth tennis program. Some court-based play had been tracked when it was organized by Burlington Parks & Recreation, but most informal play enjoyed by tennis or pickleball individuals or groups is not captured in the permitted data because no permit is required for court use.
5. Registration data provided covers the last three years of youth sports leagues from Fall 2022 to Spring 2024, and includes soccer, lacrosse, baseball, and softball.
6. Where available we've incorporated youth sports registration data into our analysis to confirm usage needs align with permitting application data.
7. It should be acknowledged that available registration data is limited to a few of the youth sports leagues run by the town and does not account for adult leagues.

The Town currently has a clear set of rules and regulations for permitting field time. These rules can be found on an Outdoor Facility Request (PDF) (Field Permit Application) document on the Burlington Parks & Recreation website under Services / Resources > Downloadable Forms. The Field Permit Application explains the permitting tiers and fees associated with permitting. Although not specified on the form, several athletic fields are available for residents to use, field conditions allowing. Field permits are required for organized or regular use on all fields. Permits are approved by the Director of Parks & Recreation and are subject to review by the Recreation Commission. The subsequent groups are prioritized in the following order of priority for permits: Burlington High School athletics, Burlington Parks & Recreation organized programs, and lastly, youth sports. Thereafter, other organizations complete the application and submit it, and they are either approved or not for a permit on a first-come, first-served basis. The application process includes:

- Complete application form and submit to the Director of Parks & Recreation.
- Submit a Certificate of Insurance (COI) (required for requests from outside organizations).
- Once submitted, a confirmation email is sent to the applicant with a notification of permitting request approval or denial.

Burlington Parks & Recreation has four (4) tiers of permitted field use. These tiers include:

- **Tier 1** - Parks & Recreation Department programs, Burlington public school sports and Burlington youth sport organizations. There is no permit fee for this tier.
- **Tier 2** - Adult or youth groups comprised of more than 90% Burlington residents, or Burlington businesses. All Tier 2 requests must be accompanied by a roster(s). There is a \$25 per hour fee.
- **Tier 3** - All events including tournaments and non-profit events. This tier requires insurance and a \$50 application fee with additional fees based on participant numbers and usage hours. These additional fees are outlined in a chart within the Field Permit Application.
- **Tier 4** - Private clinics, camps, and all other groups. Like Tier 3 applications, Tier 4 also requires insurance and a \$50 application fee with additional fees based on participant numbers and usage hours that are outlined in a chart in the Field Permit Application.

Each permit includes data on the facility location, start date, organization, start and end times, total hours requested, and the reservation purpose. Totaling and filtering this data in various ways produced a series of detailed charts that are included in Appendix F. These charts were analyzed and offer a variety of information and usage comparisons, including:

- Impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on recreation
- Regional and community-specific sports trends
- Potential increase in early youth sports specialization
- Possibility of block booking to ensure facility availability
- Gender equity in sports facilities and programming and the impact on usage
- Youth versus adult sports leagues
- A town-wide comparison of total facilities usage

Like so many communities everywhere, the COVID-19 pandemic impacted Burlington's recreational opportunities during 2020. The Town experienced a severe drop in all sports permitting, except for baseball, softball, track and field, and basketball. Spring sports, including baseball, softball, and track and field may have already been permitted ahead of the start pandemic in March 2020, but the data does not include whether those facilities were used during that time. Track and field experienced only a slight drop in permitting, perhaps due to the individual non-contact nature of this sport, allowing for continued competition during a time that demanded physical separation from others. Basketball may have had less of a drop in permitting since it is a winter sport and came at the end of the health crisis. Whatever the reasons, many field sports that did have noticeable drops in permitting sprang back immediately in 2021, the year following the pandemic, with more vigor than pre-pandemic permitting. These sports that experienced a resurgence included football, soccer, track and field, tennis, cricket, lacrosse, and basketball. Testimony from Burlington Parks & Recreation also observed an increase in the use of outdoor facilities as residents enjoyed a renewed appreciation for outdoor sports, post-pandemic.

Over time, and throughout the New England region, an ebb and flow typically exists in the popularity of certain recreational activities. Burlington is no exception to this pattern. Permitting data for the last six years reveals an increase in participation in soccer, lacrosse, cricket, football, and flag football in Burlington. Available registration rates of youth soccer and lacrosse align with permitting data, indicating an increase in registration numbers over the last three years.

Permitting for tennis courts also continues to increase, driven by school teams and youth tennis programming by Parks & Recreation. Pickleball is an incredibly popular sport especially among adult cohorts throughout Massachusetts; some limited data for pickleball court programming for 2022 and 2023 is available and shows an increase in this sport. Non-programmed, informal play on the tennis and pickleball courts does not require a permit so it is difficult to understand fully how much usage Burlington's courts receive. According to permitting data available in 2024, baseball, softball, track and field, field hockey, basketball, and ultimate frisbee have all seen a decrease in permitted field use, suggesting a decrease in the popularity of these sports. Available registration data suggests that youth baseball and softball registration numbers have leveled off in the past three years. Overall, the town has exhibited a very consistent participation rate across its athletic field-based sports, more than its courts and diamonds. This increase in activity and popularity continues to put pressure on existing athletic field facilities and may point towards a need for additional fields or an additional synthetic turf field with lighting to extend playing times.

Soccer, with its increased permitting year on year over the last six years, showed 8,000+ permitted hours in the last year alone (between April 2023 and May 2024). Available registration data for youth soccer also indicates steady growth over the last three years with registration for Spring 2024 surpassing 1000 registrants. Reasons for such high permitted usage and registration may be explained by an increase in early youth sports specialization, with children and teens choosing to play one sport throughout the year, rather than multiple, season-specific sports. As youth sports become more competitive, they are trending toward 10-month seasons, rather than traditional fall or spring season sports. This level of nearly continuous play adds additional stress to the physical condition of the fields and impacts field availability. *Block permitting* – when leagues apply for significant blocks of field use time to allow for choice practice and game times – may also add to the high permitting data for soccer. In the case of block permitting, the hours permitted may not reflect actual usage of the athletic fields.

Cricket is also trending upward in Burlington, with much higher use hours than those tracked pre-pandemic. Unique to the Greater Boston Area of Massachusetts, new cricket leagues have increased this sport's popularity and demand for recreation resources including dedicated cricket fields. Like softball in Burlington, cricket's popularity is limited primarily to adult sports leagues that rent the athletic fields during the short May-through-September window. Burlington Parks & Recreation notes that these two sports are the only two field-based sports permitted for adult usage. Despite the increased demand for cricket, locating a dedicated cricket field is challenging due to the sport's large field size. The need for a stabilized area for bowling and batting in the middle of the field constrains how a multi-use field system can overlap. Identifying sports trends and understanding youth and adult league demand can help Burlington Parks & Recreation reprogram existing underutilized recreation resources adaptively to accommodate new sports trends or actively plan for additions to the recreation system.

Permitting data also reveals which recreational facilities in town are used most frequently. Athletic fields at Burlington High School, Marshall Simonds Middle School, and Francis Wyman Elementary School are heavily permitted. Among Parks & Recreation managed facilities, Rahani Playground, Simonds Park, and Wildwood Park have the most permitted usage, with nearly 5,000 use hours between spring 2023-2024. High usage requires careful management and maintenance. Recreation plans should consider how underutilized outdoor facilities in Town might be modified to accommodate new recreation uses and distribute needs across Burlington's recreation system.

## 3. What We Heard

Feedback received during the comprehensive public engagement process served as a crucial piece in the identification of important community needs, and ultimately, actionable recommendations. The engagement process included (2) online public surveys, tabling at Burlington's annual Community Tree Lighting Event, and an evening stakeholder input meeting. Input from these events is summarized in the following sections.

### 3.1. Online Public Surveys

Online surveys provided a valuable platform for collecting input from the community regarding improvements to existing facilities and desired outdoor recreational amenities. Table 3-1 shows a summary of background information about the questions, duration, platform, and responses for each of the (2) online public surveys. The questions and full results from these surveys are included in

Appendix A: Online Survey Questions & Results.

The first online public survey was administered by Parks & Recreation and focused on obtaining feedback about proposed concept designs for Simonds Park and Overlook Park.


Based on the four-question survey on the proposed improvements at Overlook Park and Simonds Park, top amenities were identified for each site. The top (3) amenities for Overlook Park were Active Play for Ages 0-12 (112 votes), Sledding Hill with a Lift (103 votes), Expanded Trails / Connection to Existing Trails (97 votes). The top (3) amenities for Simonds Park were Water Play (137 votes), Active Play for Ages 5-12 (125 votes), and Active Play for Ages 13+ (113 votes).

The second survey, administered by Weston & Sampson and developed in collaboration with Parks & Recreation, collected comprehensive input on town-wide outdoor recreational amenities. Results from the town-wide Recreational Amenities survey are portrayed in Figure 3-2 and Figure 3-2. Figure 3-1 presents the most frequented properties and most desired improvements. In Figure 3-2, the green boxes relate to comments regarding existing uses or amenities; findings in the blue boxes relate to new, desired features or expanded outdoor recreational amenities; and the light blue box includes information about the demographics of the respondents.

## 3.2. Community Tree Lighting Event

In addition to collecting online feedback from the surveys, in-person events also offered an important means of gathering input from the community. Each year, Burlington holds a popular Community Tree Lighting Event on the Town Common that attracts thousands of visitors from Burlington and the surrounding communities. Weston & Sampson and Parks & Recreation staff hosted a table at this event with boards depicting concept plans for Overlook Park and Simonds Park and precedent images of the proposed amenities. Figure 3-3 illustrates the most-voted-on amenities. A full description of the event, the results, and the boards are included in Appendix B: Community Tree Lighting Event Results.

## 3.3. Stakeholder Engagement Event


An in-person Stakeholder Engagement Event was held on April 30, 2024 at Grand View Farm in Burlington, Massachusetts. The first 30 minutes of the event included a presentation on the project background and purpose, input from the community to date, community needs analysis findings, draft strategic recommendation themes, and a 5-minute question-and-answer session. After the presentation portion of the event, participants rotated through 3 topic tables (which correspond to the draft overarching themes) and provided feedback on the draft strategic recommendations.

# STRATEGIC RECOMMENDATIONS

## 4. Strategic Recommendations

Developed from public feedback, observations from on-site evaluations, and analyses of existing conditions, three overarching goals define the OFMP: *Improve Existing Outdoor Recreational Opportunities*, *Expand Outdoor Recreational Facilities*, and *Provide Equitable Access to Outdoor Recreational Facilities*. Each goal is comprised of themes that correspond to Burlington's key community needs. Together, these goals and themes create a structure that serves as a guide for Burlington's future outdoor recreational investments.

The text below describes how each theme is supported by the public engagement process and existing conditions analyses. Following the discussion of these themes are actionable strategic recommendations.

### 4.1. Goal 1: Improve Existing Outdoor Recreational Opportunities

#### 4.1.1. | Theme #1: Improve Existing Playgrounds

- **On-site Observations:** Observed in the site evaluations, 9 of Burlington's existing playgrounds could benefit from replacing aging equipment, diversification of play value, and incorporation of accessible play components and surfacing.
- **Online Surveys:** Burlington's existing playgrounds are well-used and highly valued by the community. As indicated in the survey results, 72% of survey respondents regularly visit the Town's playgrounds, and 36% of online survey respondents indicated a need to improve accessible play features.
- **In-Person Feedback:** At the Community Tree Lighting event, voting from the community revealed play as a top priority. Active play for ages 0-12 (31 votes), slope play (40 votes), active play for ages 13+ (46 votes), and a zipline (27 votes) comprised many of the top voted amenities of the precedent images presented.

#### 4.1.2. | Theme #2: Upgrade Fields and Courts

- **On-site Observations:** It was observed that almost all properties with fields and courts could benefit from new or upgraded field amenities, including upgraded benches, spectator seating, and upgrades to existing lighting. Seven properties have opportunities for replacement and/or consolidation of existing basketball, volleyball, and four-square courts.
- **Online Surveys:** 55% of survey respondents highly favor or favor investing in courts. Write-in responses also encouraged the conversion of high-use natural turf fields to synthetic turf.
- **In-Person Feedback:** At the Stakeholder Event, feedback and discussion focused on maximizing existing field space, citing opportunities for correcting drainage problems, optimizing field scheduling, and incorporating irrigation to expand available use hours.

### **4.1.3. | Theme #3: Upgrade Park Amenities**

- **On-site Observations:** With expanded site amenities, there is an opportunity to create a standard furnishings palette that would help ease maintenance and create a consistent look throughout the Town.
- **Online Surveys:** At 4 of the 5 most frequented recreational properties, survey respondents indicated a desire for additional site amenities such as benches, picnic tables, drinking fountains, and restrooms.

## **4.2. Goal 2: Expand Outdoor Recreational Facilities**

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### **4.2.1. | Theme #1: Expand Water-Based Play Opportunities**

- **Online Surveys:** 76% of survey respondents highly favor or favor additional opportunities for water play, such as splash pads or swimming pools.
- **In-Person Feedback:** At the Community Tree Lighting Event, splash pad received the most votes (46) out of all amenities proposed as part of the Simonds Park Master Plan. Discussions at the Stakeholder Engagement event also supported water play, with 10 out of 15 participants agreeing or strongly agreeing with this theme.

### **4.2.2. | Theme #2: Create Opportunities for Winter Sports**

- **Online Surveys:** 69% of survey respondents highly favor or favor additional winter sport amenities.
- **In-Person Feedback:** At the Community Tree Lighting Event, the sledding hill received the most votes (47) out of all amenities proposed as part of the Overlook Park Master Plan. Though discussions at the Stakeholder Event were mixed, 10 out of 16 participants agreed or strongly agreed with creating opportunities for winter sports.

### **4.2.3. | Theme #3: Incorporate Expanded Active Recreational Programming into Underutilized Sites**

- **On-site Observations:** Based on site evaluations, at least 5 of Burlington's recreational properties offer potential for additional for expanded recreational programming.
- **Online Surveys:** Desired additional active recreational amenities include a pump track, designated cricket pitch, and pickleball courts.
- **In-Person Feedback:** Discussions at the Stakeholder Engagement event also supported the idea of exploring underutilized parcels for recreational development, including TRW Playground and identifying small town-owned properties that are currently not being used

for recreational purposes. Like feedback from the survey, discussions revealed that additional cricket field space and pickleball courts are desired expanded amenities.

#### **4.2.4. | Theme #4: Expand Pedestrian and Bicycle Infrastructure**

- **Online Surveys:** 74% of survey respondents highly favor or favor the creation of additional paved biking paths. 84% of survey respondents highly favor or favor the addition of more walking or jogging paths.
- **In-Person Feedback:** At the Stakeholder Event, discussions surrounded connecting pedestrian walks between recreational properties to improve walkability to parks and outdoor resources. 10 out of 16 participants agreed or strongly agreed with this theme.

#### **4.2.5. | Theme #5: Expand Walking and Hiking Opportunities**

- **Online Surveys:** 84% of survey respondents highly favor or favor investing in walking / jogging paths, and 71% of survey respondents highly favor or favor investing in hiking trails.
- **In-Person Feedback:** At the Community Tree Lighting Event, expanded trails was a top desired amenity receiving 24 votes from the community. At the Stakeholder Event, 14 out of 16 participants agreed or strongly agreed with this theme.

### **4.3. Goal 3: Provide Equitable Access to Outdoor Recreational Opportunities**

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#### **4.3.1. | Theme #1: Improve Universal Accessibility**

- **On-site Observations:** Based on a comprehensive on-site inventory and opportunity analysis, all of Burlington's recreational facilities would benefit from accessibility improvements, including the addition of accessible paths between parking and recreational amenities, locating site amenities along accessible routes, and providing accessible parking spaces where feasible.
- **Online Surveys:** 62% of survey respondents desire improvements to accessible restrooms and 34% of respondents desire improvements to paths, ramps, and curb cuts.
- **In-Person Feedback:** At the Stakeholder Event, 15 out of 16 participants agreed or strongly agreed with this theme. Discussions emphasized the incorporation of physical interventions that support ADA accessibility.

### **4.3.2. | Theme #2: Improve Geographic Distribution of Outdoor Recreational Opportunities**

- **In-Person Feedback:** Discussions cited connectivity between parks through pedestrian and bicycle infrastructure as important potential improvements for the Town. While discussions were mixed on the development of the Vine Wellfields property and which neighborhoods are considered underserved, the majority of participants agreed or strongly agreed with this theme overall.

**Town Insight and Recreational Facilities Mapping:** The Lord Baron and Wynnmore neighborhoods were identified as Environmental Justice Communities in the Town's Open Space and Recreation Plan in 2019. The neighborhoods are currently undeserved by recreational facilities and the parks within and in proximity to these neighborhoods would benefit from additional amenities and focused improvement efforts. Implementing the Master Plan for Overlook Park and the conversion of the Vine Wellfields into a recreational amenity would provide access to outdoor facilities in these neighborhoods.

## **4.4. Strategic Recommendations**

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Table 4-1, below, identifies actionable strategic recommendations organized by goal and theme. For each recommendation, the following has been identified:

- **Location(s):** Specific properties where it is suggested that the recommendation be implemented, if applicable.
- **Design Considerations and / or Resources:** Design considerations include parameters required to site a particular amenity, such as dimensions for pickleball courts or cricket fields. Resources include relevant codes, existing Town plans, and existing documents created by other entities that can help guide the implementation of the recommendation.

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



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This memo summarizes the results of the online community survey. The survey was open between February 25, 2024 and March 25, 2024 and received 164 (159 online, 5 hard copy) responses.

## Part 1: How do you currently use recreational facilities?

- 73% of respondents indicated that recreation is very important to them.
- 35% of respondents visit Burlington's recreational facilities 3 or more times per week, and 36% of respondents visit Burlington's recreational facilities 1 or 2 times per week.
- 94% of respondents typically drive to recreational facilities, followed by 55% of respondents who walk to recreational facilities.
- The top 3 active recreation amenities used by respondents are: playground (72%), sledding hills (44%), and soccer fields (44%).
- The top 3 passive recreation amenities used by respondents are: walking or jogging paths (85%), hiking trails (63%), and nature areas for wildlife viewing (45%).

## Part 2: How can we improve our recreational facilities?

- 53% of respondents indicated that Burlington's existing recreational facilities do not currently meet their personal recreational interests. Top reasons or facilities desired are as follows:
  - Expanded paved bike facilities, including paths, lanes, and racks
  - Improved playgrounds
  - Expanded walking trails
  - Improved field conditions
  - More synthetic turf fields
  - Swimming pools
  - Cricket pitch
  - Teen center
  - Covered picnic area

- More pickleball courts
  - Expanded inclusive elements, particularly at play areas
- 48% of respondents indicated that they do not use Burlington's recreational facilities more frequently because conditions are poor. Respondents indicated a number of additional reasons, with the most frequently cited below:
  - Cleanliness / not enough waste receptacles
  - Bathrooms limited or in poor condition
  - Playgrounds need upgrading
  - Concerns with safety of bicycle and pedestrian routes
- The top 5 most frequented facilities and top improvements desired are as follows:
  - Simonds Park – 39% of respondents desire improved maintenance and upkeep
  - Wildwood Park – 46% of respondents desire additional amenities (i.e. restrooms, signage, seating)
  - Mary PC Cummings Estate – 45% of respondents desire additional amenities (i.e. restrooms, signage, seating)
  - The Town Common – 55% of respondents desire additional amenities (i.e. restrooms, signage, seating)
  - Marshall Simonds Middle School – 40% of respondents desire additional amenities (i.e. restrooms, signage, seating)
- Across all properties, the most frequently cited desired improvements are: additional amenities, maintenance and upkeep, and active recreational amenities.
- Respondents highly favor or favor investing in the following active recreational amenities:
  - Create additional opportunities for water play (46% highly favor, 30% favor)
  - Create additional paved biking paths (37% highly favor, 37% favor)
  - Create more winter sport opportunities (28% highly favor, 41% favor)
  - Create more playgrounds (26% highly favor, 27% favor)
  - Create more courts (25% highly favor, 30% favor)
- Respondents highly favor or favor investing in the following passive recreational amenities:
  - Create more walking and jogging paths (42% highly favor, 42% favor)
  - Create more hiking trails (31% highly favor, 40% favor)
  - Create additional nature areas for wildlife observation (27% highly favor, 35% favor)
  - Create more picnic areas (20% highly favor, 40% favor)
  - Create an outdoor amphitheater (17% highly favor, 36% favor)
- Respondents indicated a need to improve or increase accessible restrooms (62%), improve or increase accessible playground features (36%), and improve graded paths, ramps, and curb cuts (34%) to better achieve inclusivity.


### Part 3: Please tell us about you!

- 42% of respondents are between the ages of 35-44, followed by 31% of respondents between the ages of 45-54.
- 90% of respondents identify as white/Caucasian, 5% as Asian/East Indian, 3% Hispanic/Latino/Latina/Latinx, and 1% as Black/African American, and less than 1% as Biracial or Middle Eastern/North African.

- 99% percent of respondents speak English as the primary language at home, and less than 2% speak Spanish, Japanese, Mandarin, Russian, Tamil, or Korean as the primary language at home.
- 45% of respondents have lived in Burlington for more than 20 years, followed by 21% of respondents who have lived in Burlington for 5-10 years.
- 9% of respondents use supports for vision, 4% for walking or climbing steps, 4% for executive functioning skills, 2% for hearing, 2% for sensory processing, and 1% for activities of daily living and less than 1% for communication.
- 58% of respondents heard about the survey on social media.

## Q1 How important is recreation to you?



## Q2 How frequently do you use Burlington's recreational facilities?











One table was located near the gazebo at the Town Common in Burlington, MA. 
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This memorandum summarizes the feedback from stakeholders received at the Stakeholder Event held on Tuesday, April 30, 2024 from 6:00 PM to 8:00 PM. There were 20 attendees (a sign-in sheet is attached). The goal of the event was to provide an update on the Burlington Outdoor Facilities Master Plan (OFMP) to date and to obtain feedback from the community on the draft recommendations. The format of the event was as follows:

- The event began with a 20-30 minute presentation that covered the following topics:
  - Project Background
  - What We've Heard So Far
  - Needs Analysis
  - Draft Strategic Recommendations
  - Q&A
- For the remainder of the event, participants broke into three equally sized groups that were assigned at sign-in. Each group rotated through three topic tables – Improve Existing Outdoor Recreational Facilities; Expand Outdoor Recreational Facilities; and Provide Equitable Access to Outdoor Recreational Facilities. Groups spent approximately 30 minutes at each topic table. The format at each topic table was as follows:
  - The assigned staff member provided an overview of the topic and the key themes within the topic.
  - Participants received a voting card with the draft strategic recommendations and were encouraged to select (1) Strongly Disagree; (2) Disagree; (3) Neutral; (4) Agree; or (5) Strongly Agree for each theme. The cards included an open-ended write in section on the back of the card for comments and explanations of answers.
  - Individual voting was followed by a group discussion on the draft strategic recommendations facilitated by the assigned staff member.
  - The assigned staff member collected the voting cards at the end of the session to tally results post-event.

## TOPIC 1: IMPROVE EXISTING OUTDOOR RECREATIONAL FACILITIES

### Voting Card Results



### Voting Card Comments

#### Site Amenities:

- More bathroom facilities are needed. Burlington Reservoir and Marshall Simonds Middle School were specifically cited locations.
- More concessions / kitchens are needed.
- There are clean and sufficient restroom facilities and great restroom availability at the fields and parks.
- Repaving of Rahanis parking receives an A+; it is much better than previously.

#### Fields:

- The striping for the multiuse fields can be confusing if there are too many on the field. There need to be plans for field layouts that make sense and can be lined properly. Sometimes coaches have played on trapezoidal shaped fields which is not ideal.
- Lighting needed for soccer fields. There is very limited availability in the fall, and often practices need to shorten as the sun sets earlier in the fall.
- The Town should maximize its existing fields to optimize availability and usable days and fix the grass / drainage.
- Existing scoreboards do not get used regularly and money could be better spent on other amenities.
- Eliminate artificial turf. There is question about the correlation between artificial turf and more knee injuries. The flexibility provided by grass fields gives more options.

- A maintenance plan for the fields is favored.
- We do not need more field amenities.
- Consider converting some baseball fields to soccer fields.

Playgrounds:

- Playgrounds have good activities especially at Wildwood and Simonds. A zipline is highly desirable.
- Some parks are in deplorable condition, especially TRW Park.
- Diversify the types and styles of playgrounds.
- We don't need playground equipment at every recreation site.
- A teen play area is not favored.

Site Infrastructure:

- Bike infrastructure between parks is desirable.
- The Town should work with Eversource to pave Reservoir Path.
- There is a need for proactive maintenance of structures, hoops, and other site infrastructure.
- There is a need for an amphitheater space with seating.

Land Use & Programming:

- The Town needs to make better use of its existing recreational resources.
- The Town also needs to find new opportunities / locations for recreational resources.

### Discussion Notes

In addition to the completed voting cards, groups discussed the three major themes during the breakout session. A summary of the discussion is as follows:

Fields & Courts:

- There are questions about the safety, expense, longevity, wear and tear of artificial turf, as well as concerns about increased injuries.
- The Town could partner with businesses to sponsor fields.
- Reorienting the fields seems like a waste of resources.
- There is a lack of maintenance and poor planning at playing fields. Lighting is limited and there are unusable field shapes.
- Parks and Recreation should take over the maintenance of all fields.
- There is not enough court time for the public, particularly tennis and pickleball.
- The fields and courts need more restrooms.
- There should not be evening lighting allowed in residential areas.

Recreation Amenities:

- Folks desire water play, paths, winter opportunities, jogging/biking paths, and improved accessibility.
- Could the track around the ballfield be paved and combined with gardening?

Communication:

- Can we better inform residents about the park facilities available?
- Do we have enough multipurpose fields so that they can be rotated or maximized such that we do not need artificial turf?

Land Use:


- Can we create access to land that may be usable, such as the land under powerlines? This land could serve as garden facilities.
- Do not limit this study to only existing spaces.

Misc.:

- Greater accessibility is needed around Mill Pond.
- Who would supervise the teen spaces? Should an indoor facility or program for teens be considered instead?
- There needs to be a priority list for spending along with this plan.

## TOPIC 2: EXPAND OUTDOOR RECREATIONAL FACILITIES

### Voting Card Results



### Voting Card Comments

#### Winter Sports:

- There was mixed reactions about winter sports. Some noted that winter sports seem like a lot of expense for minimal use. There is plenty of space at Simonds and Marshall Simonds Middle School for sledding. We already have the Ice Palace for skating (though would like to see more community hours there). Others favor the addition of an outdoor ice rink, but not sledding.

#### Water Play:

- A splash pad would be highly desirable, especially for families with younger kids. Simonds Playground would be a good location for this.

#### Bike & Pedestrian Infrastructure:

- Connect to the Minuteman Trail by bike route, to the extent possible.
- Connect bike paths in other Towns.
- Go after federal grants for safer roads.

#### Teens:

- There is a need to increase programs for teens.
- There were mixed reactions to the play equipment for teens. Would they use this? Could we expand community center indoor programs instead?

## Active Recreation:

- An additional cricket field is favorable.
- TRW would be a good place for other uses.

## Discussion Notes

In conjunction with the completed voting cards, groups discussed the (5) major themes during the breakout session. A summary of the discussion is as follows:

### Fields & Courts:

- MITRE Fields are underutilized.
- Cricket recently moved to MITRE Fields, but one cricket field is not enough for this town. Could TRW Park be a location for a dedicated cricket field?
- Pickleball is huge. We need more courts to support the use.
- More tennis courts are desirable.
- The fields behind the Recreation Department appear to be underutilized.
- For lacrosse, the main season is spring but there are also clinics in the summer and fall. Often it is hard to find field space for lacrosse.

### Winter Sports:

- There are mixed reactions to winter sports. Some noted there is not much snow anymore and it would be costly to maintain the winter sport activity proposed. There was concern specifically expressed for an outdoor ice rink. What would the technology entail to keep it frozen given warmer winters? We already have the Ice Palace, but some noted that the hours for community use are very limited and would alternatively support an outdoor rink.
- Did the time of year impact the survey results? Perhaps the large share of votes for winter sports happened due to the community event and survey timing.

### Water Play:

- Could we make the wading pool larger?
- A splash pad is desirable.
- Some folks would love an outdoor swimming pool that caters to all ages. Other folks are concerned with the maintenance and liability and wonder whether an outdoor swimming pool is worth the expense given the short summer season. Some noted a preference for private pools in Town that can own this liability.
- Could there be a splash pad on the Town Common in front of the gazebo?

### Bicycle & Pedestrian Infrastructure:

- There was concern expressed over bike lanes. The roads are very busy and there are dangerous conflicts between cars and cyclists.
- There was opposition expressed about the bike lanes approved on Cambridge Street starting at the high school. This project reduces traffic lanes and will be dangerous for cyclists.

- It is hard to know where the trails and walking areas are in Town.
- Expanding walking and biking paths is highly favorable.
- Connectivity between parks is very important – walking and biking paths should connect parks. The Town is not very walkable, and the thoroughfares are dangerous to walk along. Folks need to drive to go for a walk.
- There is a Mystic Link Trail project happening between North Andover and Boston. Could there be a spur that connects to Burlington?

Teens:


- There were questions about the need for teen amenities. Do they have any community center programs?

Land Use:

- The Town needs to look at small parcels that are owned by the Town but underutilized. Some locations noted were Mill Pond, a parcel on Sandy Brook Rd, and a parcel near Pine Brook which is now full of trash. These spaces in Town could be used for recreational purposes but are currently underutilized.

### TOPIC 3: PROVIDE EQUITABLE ACCESS TO OUTDOOR RECREATIONAL FACILITIES

Voting Card Comments

Paths:

- Wider and smoother paths would be appreciated.
- It might be too challenging to create accessible pathways at all locations.
- More walking paths are desired.

Maintenance:

- Clean up trash at recreation sites.
- Make sure that any proposed upgrades can be maintained, as it costs money to maintain them.

Vine Brook Wellfields Connection:

- There is concern about the environmental impact of developing the Vine Brook wellfields.
- Vine Brook wellfields need to be utilized.
- A connection through the Vine Brook wellfields could be by bike route.
- A connection through the Lord Baron neighborhood to Burlington Mall Road is far and could be challenging.

Connectivity:

- Wayfinding is needed from Chandler to the Town Line.
- A better connection is needed between the Landlock parcel from Burlington.
- Better access to Francis Wyman should be provided.

Economic Development:

- Investing resources into areas underserved by outdoor facilities should tie into economic development initiatives.

Misc.:

- Precincts 7, 3, and 4 are too congested.
- Adding amenities near Lord Baron and Mall Road would become unsafe with the amount of traffic in the area.
- Wildmere is being renovated.
- Utilize the reservoirs for passive recreation near the Peach Orchard Apartments.
- More parking is needed.

### Discussion Comments

In conjunction with the completed voting cards, groups discussed the (2) major themes during the breakout session. A summary of the discussion is as follows:

Site Amenities:

- Prioritize site furnishings.

Connectivity:

- The town is disconnected, and automobile-driven. Consider bike connectivity.
- How do we connect the parks together? This will bring people together. For example, Wildwood Park and Simonds Park have a connection via Bedford Street.

Accessibility:

- Physical interventions for ADA accessibility should be a given on all future projects. Ensure people can park nearby where they want to go.
- Connectivity between amenities and between amenities and parking was endorsed.

Funding:

- Consider public-private partnerships and how to leverage investment to support park maintenance and improvements.
- There was much concern about funding of projects and how recommendations may be implemented – who pays for it? Is it by taxes? Grant funding?

Misc.:

- There were opposing views that the Lord Baron neighborhood is actually in a recreation and open space deficit. Folks who grew up there noted a court and a small greenspace. The area was/is bikeable and connected to nearby parks that it felt like there were recreational resources nearby.

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## **CIRCULATION & CONNECTIVITY NOTES:**

There are two vehicular entrances to the site (asphalt) - one near the courts and upper fields to the north, and a second near the playground. There are asphalt walks that connect the parking to the playground area - one of the walkways is partially covered by wood fiber surfacing. A wide gravel path connects the parking to the softball field and dog park. A wood bridge over a stream is in fair condition and connects the gravel path on the south side of the park to the upper courts and fields.

## **PLANT MATERIAL NOTES:**

There are mature evergreen trees along the perimeter of the site, and medium sized deciduous trees along the southern edge of the upper fields. There is dense understory growth along the stream.

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## **VIEWSHEDS & HISTORICAL RESOURCES NOTES:**

Vegetation along the stream partially conceals views between the upper and lower sections of the park.

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## **ENVIRONMENTAL RESOURCES & CONCERNS NOTES:**

There is a stream that runs through the site and wetlands along the perimeter of the site. Potential upgrades should consider sensitive wetland environmental conditions and any required associated permitting. Vegetation management along the stream is needed.

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## **RECOMMENDED STRATEGIES & ACTIONS:**

- Upgrade play equipment and incorporate a range of motor and cognitive play opportunities. Add accessible, inclusive equipment and upgrade surfacing to be accessible.
- Make play surfacing flush with adjacent path.
- Locate caregiver seating along accessible surfacing at the playground.
- Upgrade the basketball court surfacing and equipment, and add court markings depending on level of use. Upgrade the chain link fencing behind the basketball hoops.
- Provide basketball court bench seating for players and spectators.
- Upgrade the softball infield.
- Provide accessible routes to fields and provide accessible spectator seating.
- Upgrade and regrade the natural turf fields, provide an accessible connection to the fields, and incorporate spectator and team bench seating.
- Depending on usage, consider replacing the volleyball netting, clearing the debris, incorporating benches for players and spectators, and providing an accessible route.

**Recommended strategies and actions (continued):**

- Upgrade the tennis court surfacing and add additional spectator seating and benches for team players.
- Create an accessible picnic area, and add additional site amenities such as drinking fountains and benches along accessible routes.
- Provide accessible routes from accessible parking to all site amenities.
- Replace the bridge over the stream with an accessible connection.
- Add accessible signage at all accessible spaces.
- Potential upgrades should consider sensitive wetland environmental conditions and any required associated permitting. Vegetation management along the stream could also be beneficial.



## ATHLETIC FIELD NOTES:

The softball infield is very wet in areas. There is uneven surfacing / rills around home plate that indicate signs of erosion. The orientation of the softball field is close to optimal. The baseball field is not oriented in an optimal direction for solar interference. There is a lot of uneven infield surfacing at the baseball field and no bases were in place at the time of the site visit (winter). The outfields overlap, so games cannot be played concurrently.

## RECOMMENDED STRATEGIES & ACTIONS:

- Depending on intensity of use, consider upgrading the team benches with covered dugouts expanding spectator seating, and adding sports lighting.
- Add accessible routes to the fields and spectator seating.
- Upgrade the infields and regrade to correct grading issues.

Field in good to fair condition, and has sports lighting. The outfield is slightly shorter than average / recommended and the field is not in optimal orientation for solar interference. The team benches and spectator seating are not accessible. There is a scoreboard. The infield is in fair condition, and there are track/tire marks observed at time of visit.

### RECOMMENDED STRATEGIES & ACTIONS:

- Provide accessible connections to the field and bleachers.
- Upgrade the team bench areas to address low points, and provide accessible connections. Consider adding covered dugout areas.
- Upgrade the team bench areas with covered dugouts and add additional, accessible spectator seating.
- Upgrade the chain link fencing near the court area and add accessible connections to the team benches.

## **CIRCULATION & CONNECTIVITY NOTES:**

There is a road that leads through the site, up the hill to the main parking lot. From the main parking lot there is a concrete path that leads to the playground, and an asphalt road that leads down to the pickleball and skate park. To access the lower courts (tennis and street hockey), stairs are required. From the main parking lot there is also a path that leads to the east little league field. Adjacent to the west fields (little league and softball) and basketball courts, there is a lower parking area without striping in fair to poor condition. Overall, most amenities are not connected to parking by accessible routes. There is also no accessible route or signage for the disc golf course, located behind the playground.

## **PLANT MATERIAL NOTES:**

Most of the site is grass turf. There are also mature oak and pine trees throughout the site, including along the playground. The disc golf course is in the woods along trails, which is dominated mostly by pine and oak species.

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## **VIEWSHEDS & HISTORICAL RESOURCES NOTES:**

The playground and main parking lot is located at a relative high point. One can see the other fields and courts from the top of the hill, and the Town Common beyond the site.


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## **RECOMMENDED STRATEGIES & ACTIONS:**

- Add additional spectator seating and upgrade team benches with covered dugouts. Provide accessible connections to the seating / fields from parking areas.
- Upgrade the asphalt path to all the pickleball courts and provide additional amenities such as seating and drinking fountains.
- Maintain the skatepark / clear debris and upgrade the asphalt path to the skatepark. Add seating along the adjacent path. Consider moving the picnic table from the skatepark to outside of the fencing along an accessible route.
- Provide an accessible route to the tennis courts, and maintain free of debris. Consider adding amenities along adjacent path such as team benches and drinking fountains nearby.
- Adjust grading in infields with wet areas and upgrade fencing.
- Upgrade the team bench areas with covered dugouts and add additional, accessible spectator seating.
- Provide an accessible route to the street hockey court.
- Provide accessible routes to all recreational amenities, including benches, picnic tables, and drinking fountains.
- Upgrade the asphalt and provide markings for the lower parking lot.
- Upgrade benches and signage at the disc golf course.

Asphalt paths provide connections between the perimeter concrete sidewalk and site features. Some low areas and cracking were observed along the asphalt paths. Most of the site is covered by open lawn space. The pavers are in good condition at the World Trade Center memorial and in fair condition at the Rotary Club garden plaza. There are two low stone walls along the paths.

## SITE AMENITIES NOTES:

There is a centrally-located bandstand and memorials include a Burlington Olympians plaque, a John F Kennedy Memorial, a World Trade Center Memorial, a Veterans Memorial Park, a Burlington Heritage Trail plaque, and individual memorial plaques and benches. There is pedestrian lighting along the paths and there is a Town of Burlington sign raised with uplighting and bounded by a low brick wall. There are (2) sculptures on the southwest corner of the site. Site amenities include backed benches with armrests along the interior paths, picnic tables, trash receptacles, and lighting. The picnic tables are not adjacent to accessible paths and do not include accessible companion spaces. There is a Rotary Club garden plaza with benches that are not directly adjacent to accessible surfacing. There is a flagpole with uplighting, and there are several additional flagpoles at the Veterans memorial.

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## **CIRCULATION & CONNECTIVITY NOTES:**

The parking area is gravel and there is signage for accessible spaces but no markings or accessible surfacing. There are no accessible connections between site elements such as between parking and playground, and the playground and the perimeter walking loop. The asphalt perimeter walking loop has uneven areas. There is no clear route between the parking and field / perimeter walking path.

## PLANT MATERIAL NOTES:

In some areas of the perimeter walking loop, the vegetation is overgrown and impedes travel and accessibility. Some invasive species such as autumn olive were noted. Maple trees and medium-sized pines are the dominant tree species along the perimeter of the site. The majority of the site is natural grass.

## **VIEWSHEDS & HISTORICAL RESOURCES NOTES:**

There are open views from the parking, playground, and across the fields. The site can be seen from the highly trafficked adjacent street.

## **ENVIRONMENTAL RESOURCES & CONCERNS NOTES:**

The site could benefit from pruning and invasive species management around the perimeter walking loop.

## **RECOMMENDED STRATEGIES & ACTIONS:**

- Create accessible parking spaces that have accessible surfacing.
- Create accessible routes to connect site amenities and parking. Create a clear route that allows visitors to access the fields, fitness area, and walking loop without traversing the playground.
- Updates site amenities such as picnic tables, drinking fountains, benches, and waste receptacles and locate them along accessible routes.
- Upgrade playground surfacing and equipment to be accessible and provide a variety of physical and cognitive, inclusive play opportunities.
- Noise mitigation strategies such as berming could offer a buffer between the site and the adjacent road.
- If desirable to keep play field programs onsite, consider fully upgrading the little league fields, including regrading, infields, and fencing. Consider adding covered dugout areas and spectator seating.
- Create a master plan for the site that includes alternative program ideas considered by the Town, such as a flexible space with outdoor games, upgraded walking trail, pickleball courts, and a splash pad.

## MEMORANDUM

The public comment period for the Burlington Outdoor Facility Master Plan (OFMP) spanned 21 days, from October 11th, 2024 through November 1st, 2024 and was available online on the Burlington Parks & Recreation Department's website, Facebook page, and Instagram account. Promotion for the public comment period was done through Burlington Parks & Recreation Department's website and social media platforms. The public comment period yielded 38 responses to the survey's three (3) multiple choice questions, as well as 25 responses to the survey's one (1) open-ended prompt. Below is a summary of the responses with the highest ratings highlighted in **blue bolded color**:

1. Improving Existing Outdoor Recreation Opportunities
  - a. **Improve Existing Playgrounds** – 31 respondents (84%) **ranked improving existing playgrounds as very important**, 7 (18%) ranked as maybe important, and 0 (0%) ranked as not important.
  - b. **Upgrade Fields & Courts** – 22 respondents (58%) **ranked upgrading fields and courts as very important**, 14 (37%) as maybe important, and 2 (5%) as not important.
  - c. **Upgrade Park Amenities** – 30 respondents (79%) **ranked upgrading park amenities as very important**, 7 (18%) as maybe important, and 1 (3%) as not important.
2. Expand Outdoor Recreational Facilities
  - a. **Expand Water-Based Play Opportunities** – 28 respondents (74%) **ranked as very important**, 7 (18%) ranked as maybe important, and 3 (8%) as not important.
  - b. **Create Opportunities for Winter Sports** – 17 respondents (45%) ranked as very important, 19 (50%) **ranked as maybe important**, and 2 (5%) as not important.
  - c. **Incorporate Expanded Active Recreational Programming into Underutilized Sites** – 12 respondents (32%) ranked as very important, 19 (50%) **ranked as maybe important**, and 7 (18%) ranked as not important.
  - d. **Expand Pedestrian and Bicycle Infrastructure** – 17 respondents (45%) **ranked as very important**, 13 (34%) ranked as maybe important, and 8 (21%) ranked as not important.
  - e. **Expand Walking and Hiking Opportunities** – 25 respondents (66%) **ranked as very important**, 10 (26%) ranked as maybe important, and 3 (8%) ranked as not important.

3. Provide Equitable Access to Outdoor Recreational Opportunities
  - a. **Improve Universal Accessibility** – 25 respondents (66%) **ranked as very important**, 12 (32%) ranked as maybe important, and 1 (3%) ranked as not important.
  - b. **Improve Geographic Distribution of Outdoor Recreational Opportunities** – 17 respondents (45%) **ranked as very important**, 15 (39%) ranked as maybe important, and 6 (16%) ranked as not important.

4. Please Add Any Additional Comments About The Outdoor Facility Master Plan

This open response question allowed for respondents to write in any additional comments about the OFMP and received 25 unique responses. Below is a summary of the most frequently commented topics:

- a. **Pool** – 9 of the respondents (36%) left comments about wanting a swimming pool. Commenters cited the expanded programming potential a swimming pool would offer beyond what a splash pad or the wading pool can.
- b. **Upgrades to Playgrounds** – 9 of the respondents (36%) had comments about playgrounds and the desire for upgrades to surfacing, seating, equipment, and shading.
- c. **Bathrooms** – 2 respondents (8%) commented on the need to provide bathroom facilities citing accessibility and maintenance concerns around the current portable toilets.
- d. **Hiking, Biking, and Walking Trails** – 3 respondents (12%) commented on the desire for expanded hiking, biking, and walking opportunities and the potential to connect with surrounding trails.
- e. **Programming** – 3 respondents (12%) commented on the desire for expanded programming opportunities including programming for families, teens, and town-wide events.
